

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# A YEAR OF TRANSITION AND HOPE

And here we are! The year 2021 marked the progressive return to fieldwork we are so passionate about. Although we have now become experts in digital communication of all kinds, nothing replaces direct contact and the feeling of being close to miners and the reality of their territories.

In 2021, a team of 74 people participated in activities, including subject-area ARM specialists from our headquarters and staff in the territories who are familiar with multiple sociocultural mining contexts in different parts of the world. From the high mountains in Peru, the mountain ranges across Colombia, the arid lands in Burkina Faso to the rainforests in Honduras, Guyana and Suriname, we have together well-organized worked with consolidated mines, as well as mines on their path towards formalization and artisanal and small-scale mining groups. Each one requires a deep understanding of the specific context, tailoring methodologies and approaches to the specific needs of the miners... Artisanal and small-scale mining truly is as much a science as an art!

We responded to this challenge in 2021 with our Sustainable Mines Program (SMP) strategy, which consolidates our methodological experiences gained over the past 15 years by proposing a work path customized for each mine. Developing our SMP has been an incredible experience for reflection and systematization. The lessons learned over the last few years are falling into place like cogs in a machine which we are now making available to our allies so that together we can scale up ASM buy-in and support for continuous improvement!

For real-time tracking and easy management and viewing of mine information and progress, we are currently developing an online database, in partnership with Betterchain, integrated into Datastake, a participatory due diligence platform. We have systematized 15 thematic methodologies, including business plans, processing optimization and return on investment assessments, recognizing that only profitable mining can maintain social, labor and environmental commitments.

During this period, gender inequality was further exacerbated, which is why we at ARM have worked to address this imbalance. In partnership with MIT Lab in Colombia, we implemented innovative approaches to social movement building and, together with UNDP, we supported women miners in developing miningrelated businesses. In Burkina Faso, 500 women and 500 men participated in courses on women's rights, gender-based violence and sexual and reproductive health, and together with Impact, we have developed savings associations to strengthen their economic resilience. Finally, in Peru, women mineral selectors participated in a political dialogue on formalization and kept expanding their jewelry workshop.

The pandemic further increased pressure on important ecosystems, against a background of biodiversity fragility and climate change. For legitimate ASM cases in forest areas, we developed and tested a Forest Smart Mining standard, a tool for environmental management of ASM in forest areas, in partnership with Levin Sources and Fauna & Flora International.











We are aware that governance is essential for ASM, which is why we continue to promote local dialogue platforms and multi-stakeholder action plans in Burkina Faso. In Honduras, we have partnered with IIED to arrange discussions between miners and the government. With our Colombian allies, we have conducted a series of intercultural dialogues on ASM from an Indigenous and Afro-Colombian community perspective. In partnership with GIZ, we took part in the development of a fiscal model for ASM. Finally, an ARM study in Cameroon provided the government with a better understanding of the country's gold and diamond supply chains.

The interaction between industrial mining and ASM is a strategic issue in global discussions, so we partnered with IRMA to promote a positive and constructive relationship. We also partnered with a Gramalote industrial mine in Colombia to support formalization processes for artisanal and small-scale miners working within the mining area of the company.

Regarding the market, Fairmined certified gold sales have not recovered their growth dynamics registered before the pandemic. However, we have also seen a high level of interest from over 100 new businesses joining our initiative in 2021.

We are also proud of the satisfaction levels of our market stakeholders: 98% of stakeholders say Fairmined makes a significant contribution to ASM development. 99% of stakeholders say Fairmined is a serious and reliable brand. Increased legitimacy and use of the CRAFT Code have also facilitated sales of more than 40 kg of Fairmined gold to formal markets.

As scrutiny of the sustainability of different mineral sources increases, ASM is becoming increasingly positioned as an option that has greater potential for positive social, environmental and economic impact, a trend that we are confident will translate into growing sales in this sector over the coming years.

Since the number of initiatives related to ASM supply chains has proliferated, we have decided to protect the robustness and legitimacy of our standards and assurance processes, while emphasizing the importance of a transparent and inclusive multi-stakeholder process. In addition, we are pushing forward with the development of a new version of the Fairmined standard to make it more comprehensive, open and easy to use for all.

All these achievements also meant a renewal of the organization. After many years, Yves Bertran stepped down as ARM Europe Executive Director to be taken over by Marcin Piersiak. Gina D'Amato took over as ARM Executive Director at the end of the year, giving rise to fresh leadership.

The Alliance for Responsible Mining is a reality today. This year, we have worked with a large number of stakeholders across the supply chain from mine to final product, allied NGOs, government institutions at all levels, donors, universities... Everyone working together for one goal: To transform the lives of artisanal and small-scale miners.

# SUSTAINABLE MINES **PROGRAM:** A PROGRESSIVE PATH

The Sustainable Mines Program (SMP) is a collaborative initiative created by the Alliance for Responsible Mining for the positive transformation of the artisanal and small-scale mining (ASM) sector, providing an ethical sourcing solution for the industry.

Together with our allies, we promote sustainability as a progressive path towards a responsible, productive and profitable value chain. To make this possible, we have built inclusive and fair partnerships with miners, development cooperation, industry, ASM-supporting organizations, impact investors and governments.





The SMP provides miners with a progressive path towards continuous improvement through standards created by ARM that are globally recognized by the industry:





The CRAFT Code provides men and women miners with a path towards legitimacy as well as formalization and progressive improvement in mining practices on a risk-based approach, enabling access to formal supply chains.

The Fairmined Standard sets more rigorous requirements for miners on their path towards responsible mining and connects them with formal supply chains to whom they sell their certified gold, gold to be proud of, and receive an additional economic incentive.









# Mining Organizations that We Support

In 2021, we supported 31 mining organizations on their path towards more sustainable practices that respect people and the environment.



Lead. Sustainability leaders. These mines are the beacon of the sector, implementing demanding economic, social and environmental practices and are committed to maintaining the Fairmined certification and continuously improving their operations and impacts.

Compliance. These mines have the potential to market their ore legally and control the worst risks associated with the sector: child and forced labor, conflict financing, money laundering and theft.

**Embrace. Embracing sustainability.** These mines are transitioning from survival to economically viable businesses.

They meet the basic health, safety and environmental management requirements of their operations.

Wake up. These mines decide to organize themselves for mining work and take their first steps towards the path of responsible mining.





### **ACHIEVEMENTS**

- Consolidating the CRAFT code as a specialized due diligence tool for ASM within the Sustainable Mines Program. An example of this is the CRAFT application in all ASM projects in Colombia, Honduras, Peru, Burkina Faso, Guyana and Suriname, to better understand local and participating miners' risks and develop mitigation plans together.
- Recognizing the CRAFT Code as a due diligence tool and integrating it into the different partners' programs, such as Planet GOLD and Gemfair.
- Being recognized by the Responsible Minerals Initiative (RMI) and LBMA as a tool for ASM and refiners.





- Training for the El Desquite, El Cangrejo and Asomisura mines on the conditions of their mine wastewater and the actions to be taken to improve discharge quality.
- The environmental management component within the framework of the implementation of the improvement plans of 9 MPUs operating under the Mineros La Maria S.AS. subcontract is 85% complete. The organization carries out reforestation activities and recycles plastics and metals.





# **Burkina Faso**

# Colombia




#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

As a result of the operation in 2021, the organization mobilized financial resources worth USD 1,243,481 (4,950 million pesos). Of the above figure, 88% corresponds to income received from Development Cooperation Projects, which amounted to USD 1,089,084 (4,336 million pesos). Within this same flow of resources, the figures of USD 52,621 (209 million pesos) and USD 8,828 (37 million pesos) stand out for concepts of products and individuals (services) and income from industry and individuals, which experienced a decrease -14% and -56%, respectively.

Revenues from FAIRMINED development and administration fees reached USD 90,695 (361 million pesos), and the financial income obtained was USD 2,253 (9 million pesos). Both presented a considerable decrease in 2021 of – 47% and - 84%, respectively.
